If you're a Registered Nurse with a bachelor's degree in nursing, the Family Nurse Practitioner (FNP) program may be right for you. In the program, you'll learn the skills to manage the primary healthcare needs of families and individuals as you collaborate with a team to provide safe, effective, and coordinated care.

As a member of the team, you will:

- Use evidence-based services and therapies to provide diagnoses and plan care for patients throughout their lifespan with primary healthcare needs, including furnishing and managing relevant medications.
- Work as an advocate for patients and their families and ensure that all are engaged and actively participating in a behavioral healthcare program.
- Expand your professional nursing skills to manage the acute and chronic health issues of those in need.

Upon graduation, you'll be eligible to sit for National Board Certification as a Family Nurse Practitioner.
